13:10 - 13:50	Lecture 2: PrEP Injectable PrEP offers opportunities to reach populations who are currently under-represented in PrEP user cohorts but involves significant costs and practical challenges. The 2025 BASHH/BHIVA Guidelines use recent evidence to allow new oral PrEP dosing options for all users, and the taking of PrEP tablets after a potential exposure. These can increase PrEP equity but may raise concerns about efficacy for users and clinicians. He has interests in HIV prevention and the sexual healthcare of gender and sexual minorities. Through a series of cases, we will discuss the evidence behind the potential causes, the challenges in the diagnosis and the treatment options, as well as review the epidemiology of PID and its implications for reproductive health. He qualified as a doctor in Spain (University of Zaragoza) and moved to the UK in 1994. Having trained as a GP in the Oxford Region, he combined work in Primary Care, GUM and Family Planning from 1998 to 2002. He has been working in Chalmers since 2006. Carlos has held various positions at BASHH (SAS representative for Scotland and member of the Educational Committee) and is currently a member of the BASHH SAS Annual Conference Organising Committee. He was the lead author for the audit on the management of PID in GUM clinics in the UK published in 2012. Carlos holds a Diploma in GUM, a PG Diploma in Infectious Diseases and is a Fellow of the Royal College of Physicians in Edinburgh.

In 2016, she trained in vasectomy and went on to establish a new Vasectomy Service for Family Planning NSW in Sydney before returning to the UK in 2019. She currently works for the Southampton Sexual Health Service, seeing GUM and complex contraception patients, and performs weekly vasectomy procedures in Buckinghamshire. Until 2024, Sophie was the FSRH SAS Lead Doctor and founded the Faculty's first SAS committee. She also represented the FSRH on SAS committees for BASHH and the Academy of Medical Royal Colleges. Sophie has contributed to vasectomy guidelines and service standards and is now developing e-learning modules. She has presented at annual

		National Vasectomy Conferences, been interviewed by BBC News, and collaborated with @TheLowdown on a vasectomy video and their recent book on contraception.
14:00 - 15:00 & 15:30 - 16:30	Workshop 4: Non-chlamydial, non-gonococcal urethritis This workshop focuses on the diagnosis and management of Non-Chlamydial, non-Gonococcal Urethritis (NCNGU), a frequent yet challenging presentation in sexual health clinics. We will explore key pathogens such as Mycoplasma genitalium, and discuss approaches to diagnosis when standard tests are negative. Practical guidance on treatment, including non-antimicrobial strategies, will be provided. Participants will engage with clinical scenarios to develop skills in managing persistent or recurrent urethritis and delivering effective patient counselling. Learning Objectives Understand causes of urethritis when common pathogens have already been excluded Apply evidence based strategies for diagnosing and managing NCNGU including cases of persistent or recurrent infection Appreciate other strategies that may address patients concerns of persistent symptoms	Suneeta Soni - University Hospitals Sussex NHS Trust Suneeta is a Consultant in Sexual Health and HIV in Brighton and Honorary Associate Professor at Brighton and Sussex Medical School. She is co-chair of the Bacterial Special Interest Group for BASHH and has authored several BASHH guidelines including M. genitalium, gonorrhoea and scabies. Her current interests are antimicrobial and diagnostic stewardship in clinical settings and in her NHS role works collaboratively with private online STI care providers to encourage guideline implementation and ensure high quality care for everyone. She is passionate about women's health and sexual wellbeing, and runs a successful bimonthly MDT vulva clinic in Brighton with colleagues in dermatology, pyschosexual therapy and physiotherapy.

His interests include care in detained and deprived populations, and he provides an in-reach service at HMP Wormwood Scrubs. He is a forensic physician at The Havens SARC in London, and a clinical tutor at Imperial College Medical School.

Lecture 4:

Epidemiology of HIV, syphilis and hepatitis B in pregnancy

This session will provide a comprehensive overview of the epidemiology of HIV, syphilis, and hepatitis B in pregnancy in England, with a focus on national surveillance data and vertical transmission outcomes. Drawing on data from the NHS Infectious Diseases in Pregnancy Screening Programme (IDPS) and the Children's HIV and AIDS Reporting System (CHARS), the session will explore how these infections are monitored during pregnancy, highlight current trends in prevalence, and examine vertical transmission rates.

Learning Objectives

- Understand the national surveillance systems used to monitor HIV, syphilis, and hepatitis B in pregnancy in England, including data sources and collection methods.
- Engage with current epidemiological trends and vertical transmission rates of HIV, syphilis, and hepatitis B in the antenatal population, using national data.
- Develop an awareness of the investigation and management of confirmed or suspected cases of vertical transmission, and recognise their implications for clinical practice and public health.

Helen Peters and Kate Francis

Helen Peters is the Manager of two national maternal and paediatric surveillance programmes: the Integrated Screening Outcomes Surveillance Service (ISOSS) and the Children's HIV and AIDS Reporting System (CHARS), both based at UCL Great Ormond Street Institute of Child Health. With a background in epidemiology and data management, Helen studied Statistics and completed a Master's in Biometry at the University of Reading.

Kate Francis coordinates the surveillance of HIV, syphilis and hepatitis B for NHS England's Infectious Diseases in Pregnancy Screening Programme through the Integrated Screening Outcomes Surveillance Service (ISOSS). She also coordinates the Children's HIV and AIDS Reporting System (CHARS).

She has extensive experience in the field of infectious diseases in maternal and child health at UCL Great Ormond Street of Child Health. Kate draws on her longstanding relationships with antenatal screening, sexual health and paediatric infectious disease teams across the country to lead the investigations of the vertical transmissions Clinical Expert Review Panels.
